2018-19: Attending his third Senators rookie camp and tournament. **2017-18:** Began the season with Ottawa (NHL) and made his National Hockey League (and professional hockey) debut in the Senators' opening night 5-4 shootout loss to Washington on Oct. 5 ... Appeared in four games for Ottawa before being assigned to the Ontario Hockey League's Windsor Spitfires on Oct. 25 ... Tied for eighth among OHL players in points-per-game average (1.50) while ultimately splitting his fourth major junior season between Windsor and the Kitchener Rangers (OHL) ... Registered eight three-point contests throughout the season ... Was acquired by Kitchener on Jan. 7 in exchange for four draft picks and defenceman Grayson Ladd ... Recorded 10 points (two goals, eight assists) in his first three games with Kitchener to help the Rangers earn three wins over that span ... Led league skaters in post-season assists (22) while pacing the Rangers in playoff scoring with 27 points and a plus/minus rating of plus-12, while appearing in each of Kitchener's 19 post-season contests ... Earned a bronze medal while representing the United States at the 2018 IIHF U20 World Junior Championship in Buffalo, N.Y., appearing in three games and recording one assist. He suffered a knee injury during Team USA's 3-2 loss to Slovakia on Dec. 28 and missed five of the team's remaining six tournament games. **2016-17:** Completed his third season of major junior hockey with Windsor while serving as an alternate captain and recording 40 points (14 goals, 26 assists) over 35 games ...
